# Message from the President

## *Haŋ Mitákuyepi – Hello my Relatives,*

2025 was a pivotal year for Owámniyomni Okhódayapi – one that was marked by important milestones, strengthened community ties and held many moments of connection.

This year, our work to heal and reconnect people to the land progressed in three meaningful ways: We finalized the path to convey our site from the federal government; we completed the design for cultural and environmental restoration of Owámniyomni and unveiled it to the public; and we welcomed Dakota people and the broader community back to the River through programming.

As we approach our 10th year as an organization, we take time to celebrate these advancements but also recognize the systemic forces that impede our efforts to restore Dakota land.

2025 began with a new presidential administration and a resurgence of racist and reductive federal policies. We feel these impacts at Owámniyomni Okhódayapi through the withdrawal of EPA funding for restoration projects, the repeal of environmental protections globally, and through immigration enforcement agents' violent and targeted attack on the Twin Cities and surrounding communities.

Our frustrations continued throughout the year as the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) repeatedly moved the mile marker for conveyance and identified new costs at our expense. We elevated issues to the highest levels of USACE leadership and pursued legal challenges where necessary.

Through it all, I am grateful for the grit and persistence of our team, partners and supporters. We are resolute in our commitment to heal land, water and relatives by reconnecting with Haha Wakpá (the Mississippi River). Together, we are creating a living monument that says, De Dakóta Makóče (This is Dakota land), and I enter Owámniyomni Okhódayapi's 10th year with pride and excitement for the transformation to come. Thank you for walking alongside us.

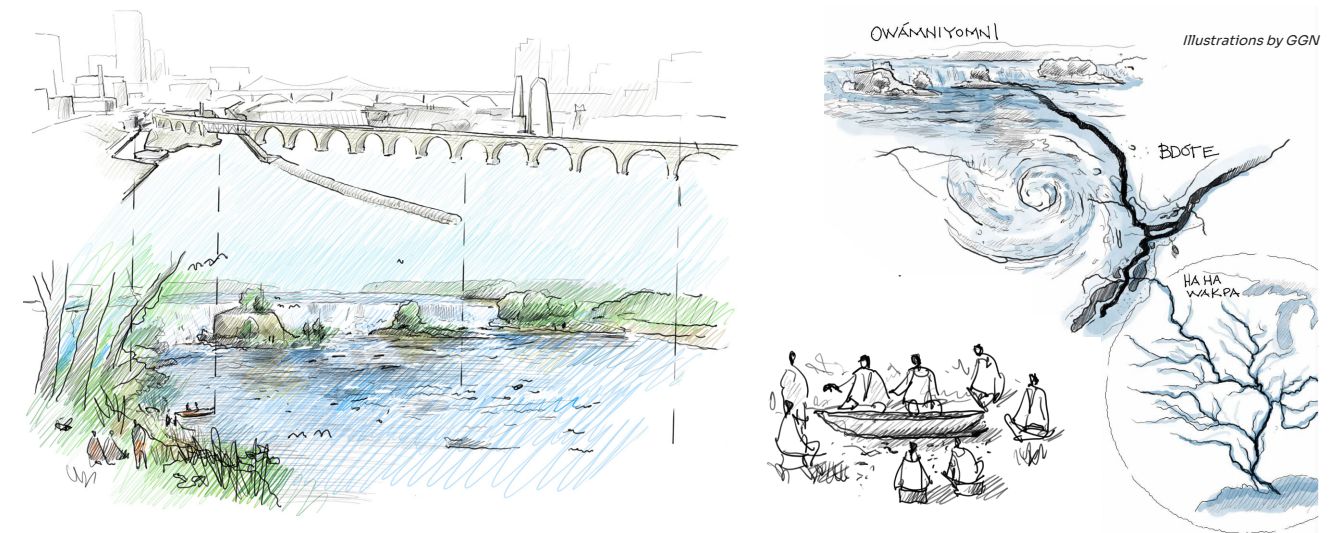

# Wókizi | Heal

Since 2016, Owámmiyomni Okhodayapi has worked to transform five acres of land at Owámmiyomni (St. Anthony Falls) into a place of restoration, education, healing and connection, as well as three additional acres owned by the Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board.

In 2025, we completed design development for the Land Transformation (Phase 1) and schematic design for the Water Transformation (Phase 2). The process was led by Dakota Knowledge Keepers representing multiple Dakota Tribes and communities, with support from landscape architecture firm GGN, Full Circle Indigenous Planning + Design, Duval and other specialists.

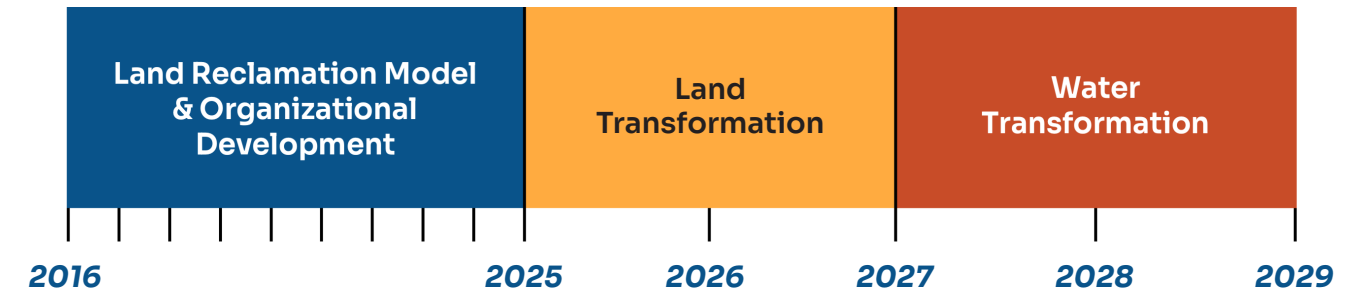
Knowledge Keepers took time to listen to the land, shared oral history and cultural knowledge, and embedded Dakota values and perspectives into the design process at every turn. The resulting design is truly transformative.

The Land Transformation (Phase 1), beginning in spring 2026, will reintroduce oak savanna and upland prairie plant species, recreate bluff conditions, and restore habitat for animal relatives. The Water Transformation (Phase 2) will transform the shoreline and create a 25-foot cascade of water that runs over Portland Avenue into the Mill Race.

Parallel with the design process, Owámmiyomni Okhodayapi met regularly with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, City of Minneapolis, Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board and other agencies to prepare for the transfer of ownership, approve the restoration plan and outline future operations. Conveyance is expected late 2026; some construction activities will begin prior.

# Awanyankapi | All Encompassing Care

To Dakota people, land and culture are interconnected (lčikhoyake), or inherently bound together. Owámniyomni Okhódayapi's operating approach mirrors this relationship and unifies care for place - Makoče Awanyankapi (land maintenance) - and care for culture - practices that sustain Dakód Wičóh'an (Dakota way of life).

In 2025, the team fully integrated the concept of Awanyankapi (all encompassing care) into its operating assumptions, specifying department and staff roles, outlining the scope of work for future maintenance contracts and projecting costs.

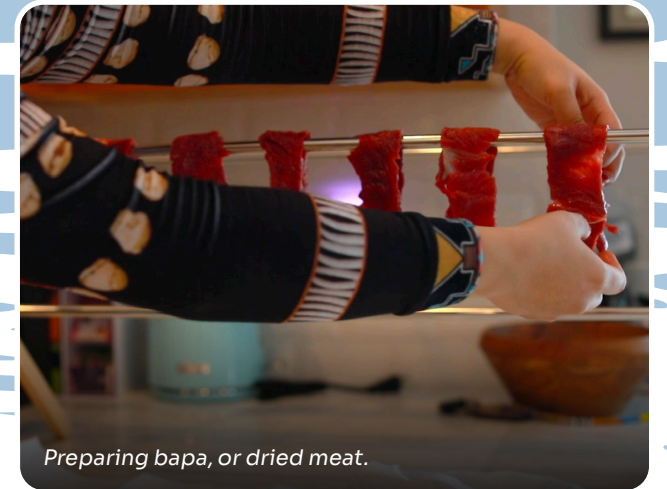
We also expanded the Owámniyomni Audio Tour that pairs Dakota language with English translation, launched an educational Dakota Lifeways video series and worked hand-in-hand with community members to craft a Canwanzi Wata, or Dakota style dugout canoe.

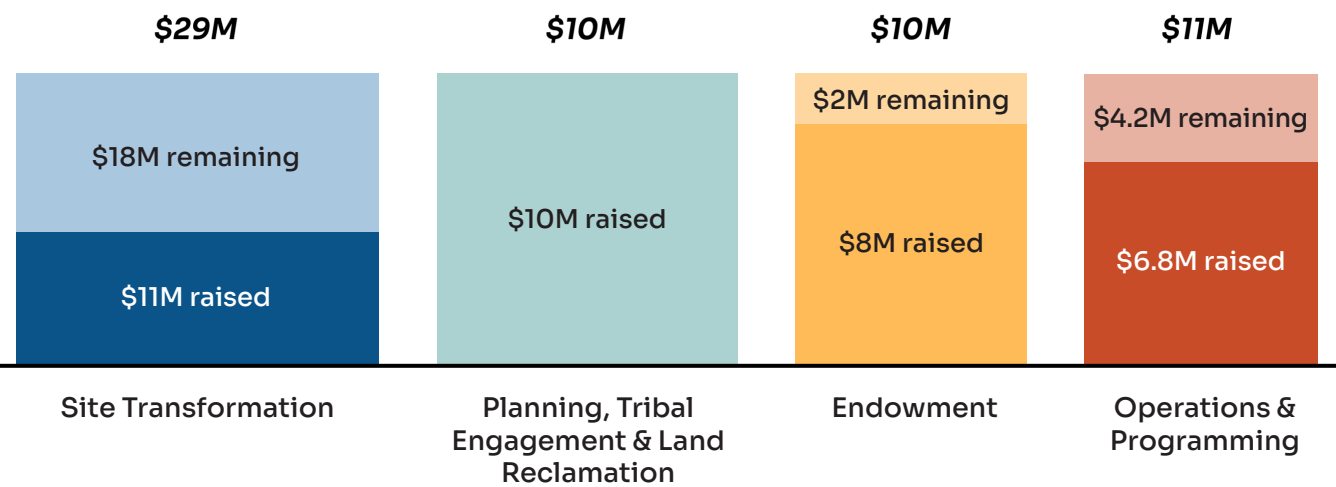

# Sĩŋkpé Núnŋpa | Two Muskrats

Owámniyomni Okhódayapi is advancing a \$60 million capital campaign, which is comprehensive of all organizational expenses from our founding in 2016 through 2028. The campaign supports site transformation, as well as Tribal engagement, cultural programming and a permanent endowment to ensure future site maintenance.

\$35 million has been raised for the Sĩŋkpé Núnŋpa (two muskrats) Campaign through 2025 from several private institutions, individual donors and public funding sources.

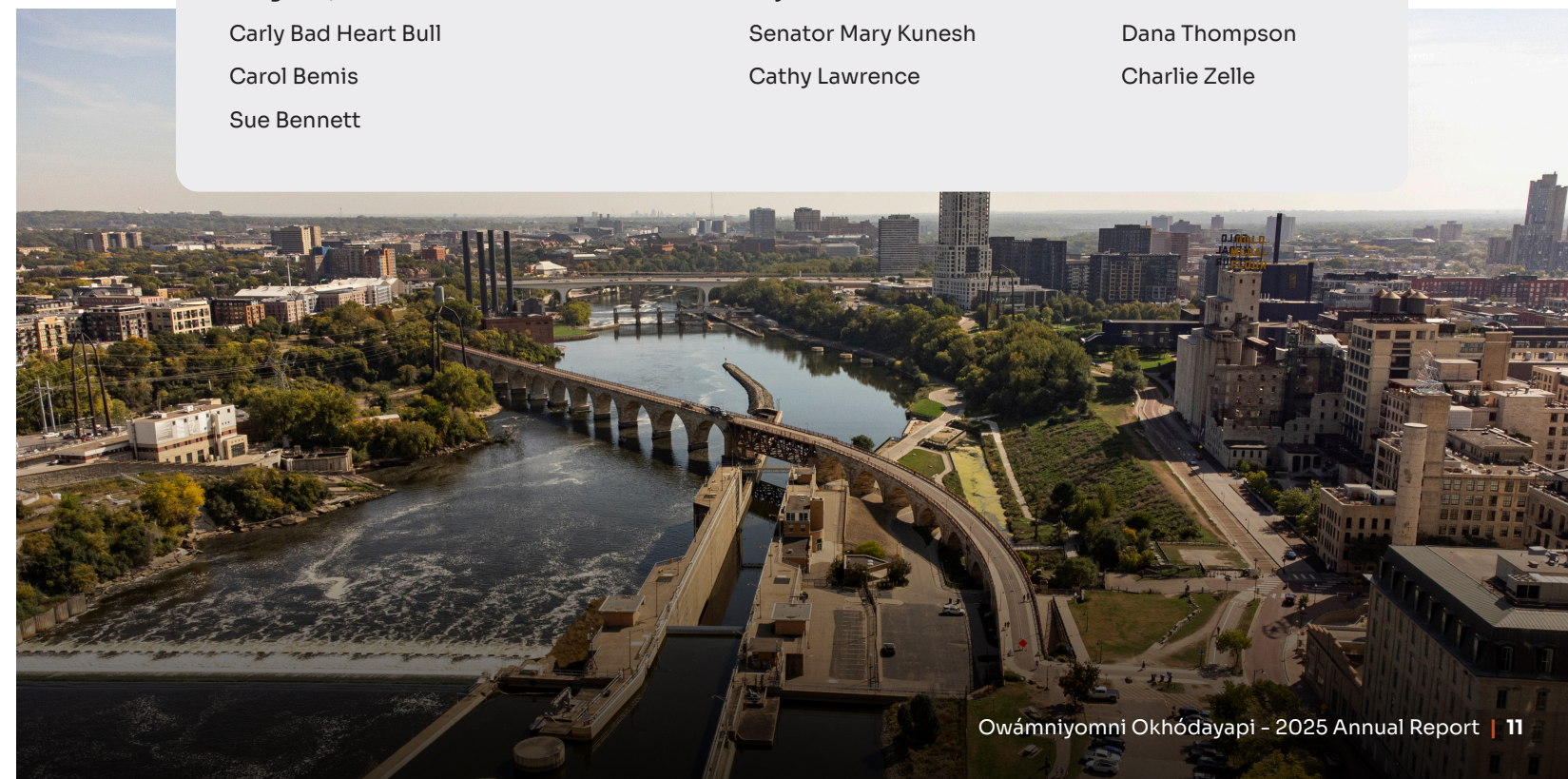

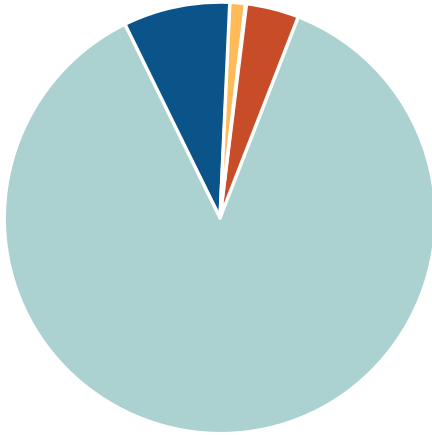

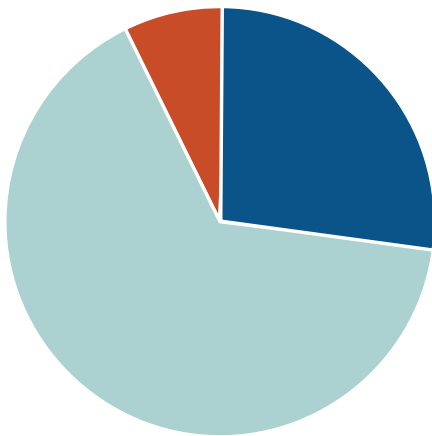


# Financials
